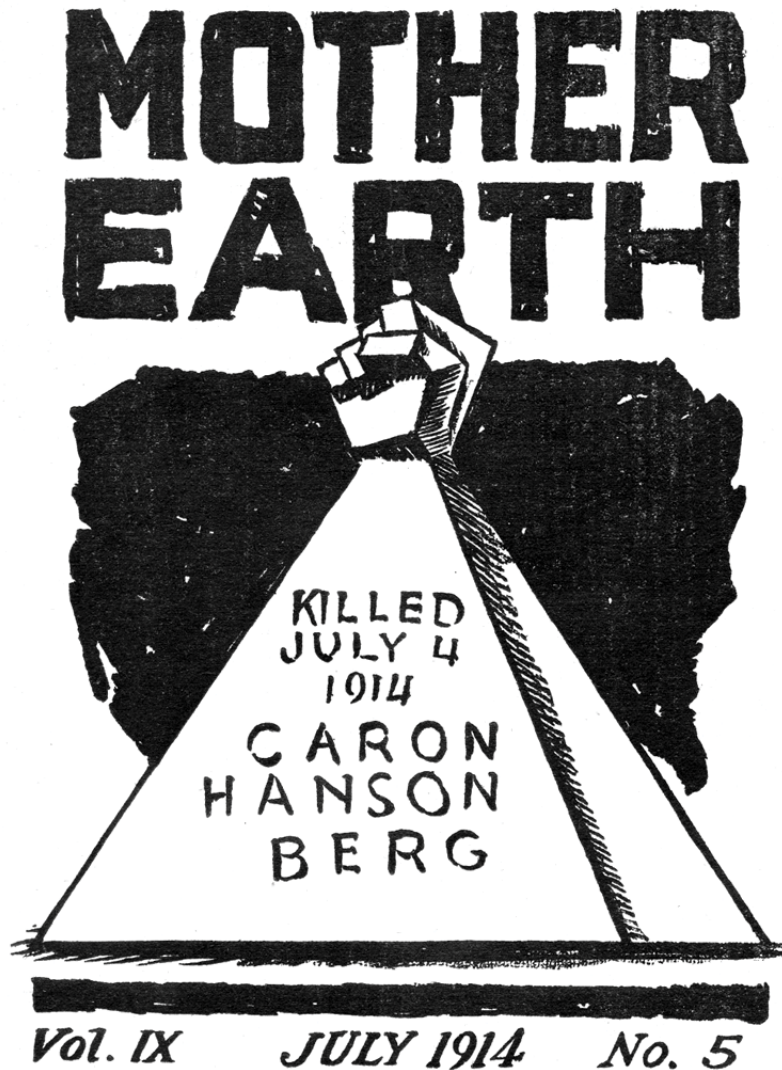

The judge then awarded "full costs" against the WRP which could well be in the nature of £70,000.*

Inasmuch as the population of the United States was about 138,000,000 in 1944 this means that more than 36% of the American people read the "Benefactor" at that time!*

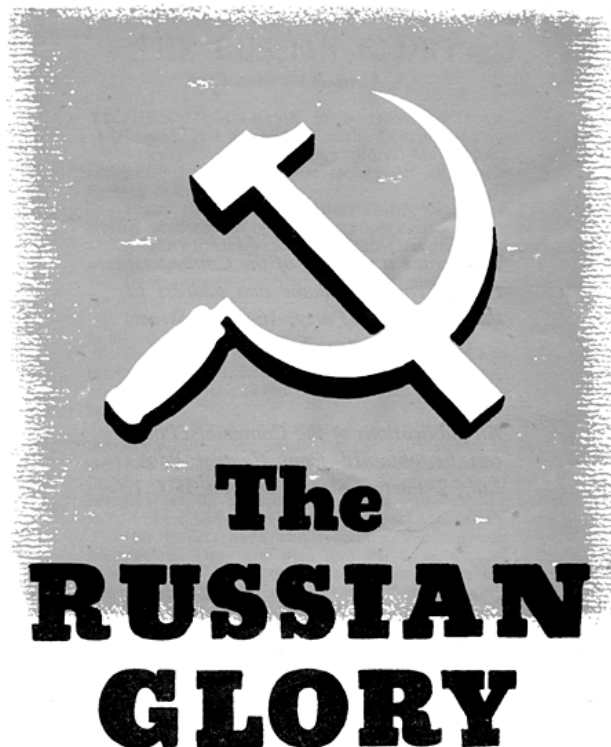
